HIGH EXPECTATIONS IN SCHOOL

As we approach the end of the first half term of the school year following the National lockdown, we continue to review practice in school in order to best meet the needs of your children in all areas of school life. We have high expectations of children's wellbeing, learning, behaviour, curriculum and presentation. Having been back at school now for seven weeks, many children have settled in well to school life. We recognise that for some children, additional support, strategies or further action is needed in order for them to thrive during this Covid pandemic. Next Friday, you will not only receive a 'Pupil Progress Update' from your child's class teacher, but you will also receive further information on what action we have taken as a school and are taking next term to further support your child.

BEHAVIOUR

Our behaviour expectations of ALL children remain high; particularly during this Covid pandemic because we are encouraging children to keep a safe distance where possible and poor behaviour can often compromise this. Behaviour of children is not just important to the safety of each individual child but also to ALL children and staff. As explained to you in the parent presentation meetings at the start of the year, there will be gaps in all children's learning from lockdown, often poor behaviour in class can prevent children from fulfilling their potential. It is therefore important that we work together to combat and further improve behaviour related issues in school. Please ensure that you have read the updated behaviour policy addendum (please see our school website) and that your child understands the role their behaviour plays in relation to their own safety and the learning and safety of those around them.

PRESENTATION

I have noticed an increased number of children wearing earrings to school and trainers on days when P.E. is not being taught. There are also a number of hoodies being brought in to school instead of school jumpers. Our school logo is of a lion and we wear this badge with pride. A smart uniform instils pride, supports positive behaviour and discipline which often in turn supports effective teaching and learning. Please ensure your child is prepared for school and is wearing the correct uniform (earrings, hoodies and trainers on days when your child is not doing P.E. is not allowed). Presentation points will be gathered from all classes next week and the presentation scores will be recorded. Let's see who the smartest class will be...!



BLACK HISTORY MONTH: All activities in school next week will be focused around Black History Month. In the past at St. Mark's, we have researched famous people in the world such as Rosa Parks and Barrack Obama. While it is important for children to learn about these inspiring people; this year, we have decided to focus more closely on the world around us and the achievements of Black British people. On <u>Friday 23rd October</u>, all of the Key Stage 2 classes will be taking part in an important workshop on Racism. The workshop will allow pupils to empathize with how it feels to be left out and to be discriminated against based on ethnicity, culture and background. Children will also look at the psychological and emotional effects of racism. Children will then be engaged in discussion about groups of people who are discriminated against, how discrimination looks and why this might be. The workshop also covers the key differences between:

- Prejudice
- Discrimination
- Stereotype

Finally, we want our children at St. Mark's to be catalysts for change so that they can build a better, fairer society for the future. Please spend a few minutes (at least) at the end of each day speaking to your child about WHAT they are learning about in school and WHY they are learning about it.

REMINDER: Aim to be Punctual NOT Late!

We are still noticing a number of children are arriving late (after 9am). We have staggered the morning and end of day dismissal times to allow for children to be dropped off and collected as safely as possible. When children arrive late to school after the gates have closed, this means that children must enter through the school front entrance and be escorted to their classroom by a member of staff. This is not only disrupting your child's learning time but also other children in their class and it is taking staff away from important duties. Please remember that we have worked hard to put plans in place to limit the contact your child has outside of their bubble, this is made more difficult when children are late. Of course, we appreciate there are occasions whereby this cannot be helped but for some children this is beginning to become a regular occurrence. You will be notified if this applies to you in writing.

Please be on time!

HARVEST:

This is an opportunity for us to give thanks for all that we have, and for those who help to grow and prepare our food. Read with a Child

The diagram above shows the impact reading has on your child's Literacy ability. We recognise that children have not been in school to read regularly to develop their reading skills, but now we must maximise every opportunity we can to ensure we close the gap in reading. We have provided Bug Club and Education City to support your child's reading ability at home. We appreciate that this is not the same as children reading a book from the school library. **However, children are still expected to read regularly at home for twenty minutes each night.** Please encourage and support your child with their reading. Fluency and expression are key reading skills and are only developed if children are heard reading aloud regularly at home. This will also develop your child's confidence in reading.
