

FIREWORKS/ FIRE SAFETY



Every year on Bonfire Night there are hundreds of accidents across the UK, and lots of them happen to children. Fireworks can be very dangerous and that's why safety is the most important thing when it comes to having a display. The Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA) say adults should deal with fireworks and that children should watch from a safe distance. Pets often get very frightened by fireworks, so watch out for them too. You might want to keep all your pets indoors and close all the curtains.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH:



Reception	Reception have enjoyed learning about a local athlete, Denise Lewis. We have enjoyed learning all about her achievements and accomplishments and some of her difficulties. We have linked this back to ourselves looking at how we are all special and how we are all different. We also held our own Olympics, participating in some of the events Denise Lewis did. We also enjoyed taking part in an African Drumming Workshop.
Y1	During Black History Month, Year 1 have been learning about the Poet Benjamin Zephaniah. They have learnt that he is from Handsworth in Birmingham. That he left school at 13 and then when back to school later in life. They have also listened to and enjoyed some of his poems. In RE, Year 1 have learnt about St. Josephine Bakhita. St. Josehine Bakhita had a very difficult life, but always had hope and faith in God. Bakhita means 'lucky one'. Year 1 also took part in drumming sessions which they really enjoyed.
Y2	For Black History Month, Year 2 began their week by looking at the history of Black History Month. We then focused on black British history, where we created a timeline of important events. As Lewis Hamilton was our significant black person, we learnt all about him and turned all our knowledge into a fact file. We also spent time discussing ways to celebrate Black History Month and looked at the Notting Hill Carnival. Then, we designed costumes for the carnival, making them as bright and vibrant as possible. Year 2 had the opportunity to experience African music by taking part in an African Drumming workshop, this was lots of fun! To end our fantastic week, we created thought provoking artwork showing support for black people all around the world.
Y3	At the beginning of Black History Week, Miss Grant gave each group a colour sticker. For a day and a half, the children had to follow the rules for their colour sticker. Some children were given privileges and others were at a disadvantage depending on what colour sticker they were wearing. The children described these actions as unfair. This experiment highlighted equality and inequality in the world, and the importance of Black History month and why we celebrate it. At the end of the time, the children were asked to throw their stickers away to symbolises getting rid of inequalities in the world.
Y4	In Year 4, we have been learning all about Cyrille Regis. He was one of the first black football players to play for England. We discussed the challenges that he faced and the difficulties that he had to overcome to be a success. We also looked at how he changed English football for the better.
Y5	For Black History Week, Year 5 have been learning all about the famous British Black boxer Nicola Adams. First, we researched about Black History Month and what year it first started. On Wednesday afternoon, we were really lucky to be able to take part in an African drumming workshop. We learnt about call and response and practised playing different rhythms both in unison and as a group. We researched information about Nicola Adams such as where she was born, her achievements and her family. Then, we learnt about the Olympics and when they first started in Ancient Greece. We compared how the Ancient Olympics to the Modern-day Olympics and looked at the similarities and differences. Finally, we had an outside visitor come into school to talk to us about racism. We talked about what makes us all unique and also learnt some new information about various significant people in Black History. We have really enjoyed learning about Black History this week and the themes will definitely stay in our minds in the future.
Y6	This week Year 6 have created a timeline of Black History, learnt about the Windrush and written their own poem about it, discovered the history of the Notting Hill Carnival as well as learning about St Perpetua and St Felicity. Year 6 worked together well to create some beautiful artwork of these Saints. In art, we studied the work of Chris Ofili and created a piece of artwork based on his work, 'No Woman, No Cry'. Year 6 have been extremely mature and worked together well as a team.

FOREST SCHOOL

The purpose of Forest School is so that pupils St. Mark's gain a greater understanding and appreciation of our natural environment. At St. Mark's, we use tools such as bill hooks, bow saws and loppers to develop children's team work, communication and confidence.
